2. If someone or something **appeals to you**, they seem attractive and interesting

The programme appeals to young children.

3. Jam

A song or piece of music, especially one by a rap or rock group

4. words fail me

Used to say that you are so surprised, angry, or shocked that you do not know what to say

5. To scratch the surface

To deal with only a very small part of a subject or problem I think we have only scratched the surface of this problem.

6. To shed light on

To make something easier to understand, by providing new or better information

Research has shed light on the causes of the disease.

Investigators hope to shed light on what started the fire.

7. Tempo

The speed at which music is played or should be played

8. Crescendo

If a sound or a piece of music rises to **a crescendo**, it gradually becomes louder until it is very loud

OPP diminuendo:

The shouting rose to a deafening crescendo.

The curtains opened as the music reached a crescendo.

9. The metaphorical use of a word is not concerned with real objects or physical events, but with ideas or events of a non-physical kind: The word has a metaphorical as well as a literal meaning.

10.Coup de gra'ce

An action or event that ends or destroys something that has gradually been getting weaker

a hit or shot that kills someone or something

11.Can't get enough of something/somebody informal

To enjoy something so much that you want more and more of it: Her millions of fans can't get enough of her.

12.Protagonist

The most important character in a play, film, or story SYN main character

13.Euphoria

An extremely strong feeling of happiness and excitement which usually only lasts for a short time:

There was a general atmosphere of pessimism after the euphoria of last year.

14.hyperbole

A way of describing something by saying it is much bigger, smaller, worse etc than it actually is

SYN exaggeration:

It was not hyperbole to call it the worst storm in twenty years.
