unexpectedly be faced with or experience (something hostile or difficult).

"we have encountered one small problem"

#### Peruse

read (something), typically in a thorough or careful way.

"he has spent countless hours in libraries perusing art history books and catalogues"

#### Ought to

used to show when it is necessary or would be a good thing to perform the activity referred to by the following verb:

You ought to be kinder to him.

#### To put on a smile

to please someone; to make someone happy. We are going to give Andy a pretty good raise, and I know that'll put a smile on his face.

#### A grim expression

very serious and unfriendly

His face was set in a grim expression.

#### Mentality

a person's particular way of thinking about things:

I can't understand the mentality of people who hurt animals.

#### what's what

the facts of a situation:

Gloria will know what's what.

Three hots and a cot (uncountable) (slang) prison. (slang) shelter.

#### be/feel at home

to feel comfortable and relaxed:

By the end of the week she was beginning to feel at home in her new job.

# bar sb from sth

to prevent something or someone from doing something or going somewhere, or to not allow something:

The centre of the town was barred to football supporters.

# Elicit

evoke or draw out (a reaction, answer, or fact) from someone.

"I tried to elicit a smile from Joanna"

# take it up a notch

'to try harder / make more effort / to make something more exciting, intense, or interesting'. The expression is sometimes written as "Kick it up a notch". It has the same meaning as "take it up a notch".

become concerned or interested in someone or something.

in order to do something
