Obligatory

something that is obligatory must be done because of a law, rule etc SYN compulsory, mandatory

be bound to

to be very likely to do or feel a particular thing

Abide

to accept and obey a decision, rule, agreement etc, even though you may not agree with it: You have to abide by the referee's decision.

Rest assured

be certain that something will happen: You can rest assured that you're going to get a good deal. Note: Used to make someone feel safe or less worried about something.

Morality

beliefs or ideas about what is right and wrong and about how people should behave:

Functionality

the quality of being suited to serve a purpose well; practicality.

Collapse

if a system, idea, or organization collapses, it suddenly fails or becomes too weak to continue: T

he luxury car market has collapsed.

Stand out

be very easy to see or notice:
