Throw sb a party

Shred of

a very small amount of something

Taken aback

Lose ones cool

maintain (or fail to maintain) a calm and controlled attitude.

Keep a cool head

stay calm in a difficult situation: I don't know how you manage to keep such a cool head in such a hectic, stressful office!

Creep out

cause (someone) to have an uncomfortable feeling of nervousness or fear : to give (someone) the creeps That guy really creeps me out.

Blow over

(of trouble) fade away without serious consequences.

"if he would simply cool off, the whole matter would soon blow over"
