able to provide all the things you need without help from other people: a self-sufficient farm

If you catch my drift

The phrase "if you catch my drift" is merely a marker to alert the listener (or reader) that there is an inference to be drawn.

Take a stroll

walk in a relaxed way, especially for pleasure: People were strolling along beside the river.

On Sunday, they took a stroll in the park.

Hood

a neighborhood

Push over

be easy to persuade, influence, or defeat: They aren't the best team in the league, but they're no pushover, either.

Bully

threaten to hurt someone or frighten them, especially someone smaller or weaker

Out of the pickle

in a (pretty) pickle

PROBLEM to be in a very difficult situation and not know what to do

Take an instant liking to someone

to begin to like someone or something: He immediately took a liking to Steve.

Grow on somebody

become increasingly liked or enjoyed by someone: Living in a small town was tough at first, but the place grows on you.

Fool around

behave in a silly way, especially in a way that might have dangerous results:

Don't fool around with matches.

Beat up

hurt someone badly by hitting them: Her boyfriend got drunk and beat her up.

Stick with someone

stay close to someone, or to continue to do something:

Stick with me, and we'll do lots of interesting things.
