#### fly the nest

(of a young person) leave their parents' home to set up home elsewhere.

#### Squat

Live in a place without paying rent

#### Come to a head

if a problem or difficult situation comes to a head, or something brings it to a head, it suddenly becomes worse and has to be dealt with quickly

Things came to a head in the summer.

#### A sticky wicket

is a metaphor used to describe a difficult circumstance. It originated as a term for difficult circumstances in the sport of cricket, caused by a damp and soft pitch.

front someone some money which means to advance it on their behalf, or possibly loan it to them

If you **scrape together** an amount of money or a number of things, you succeed in obtaining it with difficulty.

#### The boondocks

is an American expression from the Tagalog word bundók ("mountain"). It originally referred to a remote rural area, but now, is often applied to an out-of-the-way area considered backward and unsophisticated by city-folk.

#### Liberated

free from social conventions or traditional ideas, especially with regard to sexual roles.

"the modern image of the independent, liberated woman"

#### Dough

money

He made a huge pile of dough working for an investment bank.

#### Reclaim

get back something that you have lost or that has been taken away from you

#### Territory

Land

#### burn a hole in your pocket

if money burns a hole in your pocket, you want to spend it as soon as you can

#### Remorse

a strong feeling of being sorry that you have done something very bad  $\rightarrow$  regret:

#### a venture

an activity or plan of action, often in business, that involves risk or uncertainty

#### Initiative

the ability to use your judgment to make decisions and do things without needing to be told what to do

#### spur of the moment

used to say that a decision, action, etc. is sudden and done without any planning:

We hadn't planned to go away - it was one of those spur-of-the-moment decisions.
