Language Focus

Intuitive

an intuitive idea is based on a feeling rather than on knowledge or facts

SYN instinctive: He seemed to have an intuitive awareness of how I felt.

Mandatory

if something is mandatory, the law says it must be done SYN compulsory, obligatory \rightarrow discretionary

save something for a rainy day

to save something, especially money, for a time when you will need it

be up creek without a paddle

to be in a difficult situation

If we don't get this contract, we're up the creek!

Bounce

if a check bounces, or if a bank bounces a check, the bank will not pay any money because there is not enough money in the account of the person who wrote it

it behooves somebody to do something

used to say that someone should do something because it is right or necessary, or it will help them

contingency

an event or situation that might happen in the future, especially one that could cause problems: a contingency plan

fall back on

have recourse to when in difficulty.

"they normally fell back on one of three arguments"

Be in a bind

In a difficult situation, usually of one's own making; having a dilemma; faced with a problem or a set of problems for which there is no easy solution.

Case scenario

It can be used to describe outcomes in short-term or long-term events. If something is described as the best-case scenario, this means that it is what people want to happen and are working to achieve. It can be compared to the worst-case scenario, which would be the worst possible outcome.

Rack up

get a large number or amount of something

The film racked up five Oscar nominations.

Overheads

money that you pay regularly as the costs of operating a business or organization

settle

pay money that is owed

settle a bill/account/claim

I always settle my account in full each month.

Turn out

happen in a particular way, or to have a particular result, especially one that you did not expect

be a pain (in the neck)

be very annoying: There were times when Joe could be a real pain in the neck.

liquidity

when a business or a person has money or goods that can be sold to pay debts

acquire

gain knowledge or learn a skill: He spent years acquiring his skills as a surgeon.

wrap (one's) head around

comprehend something that one considers challenging, confusing, or a foreign concept.

dough

money

savvy

someone who is savvy is clever and knows how to deal with situations successfully: savvy consumers

skimp on

not spend enough money or time on something, or not use enough of something, so that what you do is unsuccessful or of bad quality

It's vital not to skimp on staff training.

keep (close) tabs on somebody/something

watch someone or something carefully to check what they are doing:

The police have been keeping tabs on Rogers since he got out of prison.

the upshot (of something)

the final result of a situation:

The upshot was that after much argument they all agreed to help her.

Money doesn't grow on trees

This means that money is something that must be earned and that it is not easy to acquire it. It often means that you should be careful how much you spend, because money is not an infinite resource

Per se

used to say that something is being considered alone, not with other connected things: The color of the shell per se does not affect the quality of the egg.

Determining

causing something to occur or be done in a particular way; serving to decide something.

"money may have been the determining factor in his decision"

I figure

think or conclude; consider

Hoarder

a person who hoards things.

"I'm a bit of a hoarder"

hoard

collect and save large amounts of food, money etc, especially when it is not necessary to do so: families who hoarded food during the strike

Galactically

With regard to galaxies, or in a galactic context. To a huge degree; immensely.

Budget-minded

Someone who is budget-minded is always thinking about their budget.

She is conscious of how much things cost, how much income or resources she has, and what she can afford

Profligate

recklessly extravagant or wasteful in the use of resources.

"profligate consumers of energy"
