The charts below show the changes in ownership of electrical appliances and amount of time spent doing housework in households in one country between 1920 and 2019.

The presented line graphs give us information about each household's weekly housework hours as well as a comparison between the percentage of households that acquire three various electrical devices, washing machine, vacuum cleaner and refrigerator, in a specific country over 1920-2019.

Overall, more and more families decided to enjoy the three devices, which resulted in a constant decline in the time allocated to house chores.

A closer look at the charts reveals that the weekly number of housework hours saw a continuous fall, reaching from 50% in 1920 to 10% in 2019.

The other chart illustrates that approximately no household owned a refrigerator in 1920, while all of them were equipped with a refrigerator after 1980. Similarly, there was an increase in the ownership of vacuum cleaner and washing machine throughout the period, with vacuum cleaner surpassing washing machine in 1960 and standing at 100% in 2000. Although all households had owned a refrigerator and vacuum cleaner by 2000, the ownership of washing machine remained below 80%.
